# HOW DO YOU CREDIT an article from another publication?

At the end of the article write **From** the original source with date published **via** the publication where you found the article with date published. An easy way to remember this is <u>alphabetical order</u> ("**From**" before "**via**") and dates in <u>numerical order</u> ("5/98" before "10/02"). In other words, the "From" will have the earliest publication date. Only one "via" is necessary – the particular publication from which <u>you</u> copied the article.

#### Is it "ITS" or is it "IT'S"?

From A Grammar Comment by Millie Heym:

I was just in the middle of putting together my September newsletter, browsing through possibilities for "borrowed" news bits from other newsletters, and there it was again – that ubiquitously wrong spelling for the possessive pronoun "its."

Here's the grammar rule, and it's (note spelling!) a simple one:

If you are using a contraction of "it is" – then you use the apostrophe. Hence the correctness of "it's" in my above sentence.

This is the ONLY time you use an apostrophe.

If you are referring to the possessive pronoun, as in "this is its best usage" -- there is NEVER an apostrophe.

That's a pretty simple rule – **NEVER an apostrophe**, **unless it's a contraction!** 

#### WHAT THE HECK IS WHITE SPACE?

Have you ever been to a rock show and visited a dealer who had so **MUCH** stuff that you just couldn't see it all? It would be easier to see what he had for sale if there was a little more space around the items.

Bulletins are the same way. To make your bulletin easier to read, and to entice your readers to sit down for the good read you know you've given them, leave some "white space" around your articles.

This means you can break up the type with clipart or graphics or titles in a larger size font or simply leave more "empty" space around your articles. It sure makes it easier on the eyes!

One other thing that improves the readability of your bulletin is the size of the type. 12-point type is the minimum, especially for eyes that now require reading glasses!

Siloam Springs, Arkansas is home to the Northwest Arkansas Gem & Mineral Society. The club was started over 50 years ago by a few people interested in gems and minerals and has grown since. General membership meetings, Kids Klub, and classes are held in an almost 100-year-old former one-room school building that has recently been refurbished.



Although our building is in Arkansas, the mailing address is Oklahoma, since that is where our Corresponding Secretary lives. Our Kid's Klub meets before our General Membership meeting each month, and they are learning all about rocks and minerals.

### Wild Thing: Traversing Buffalo Gap and Looking for the Unkpapa Sandstone

In spring 1965 I made a critical decision or two—what to do with my life after college graduation in Kansas (BS Geology). I had pretty much decided during the fall semester that I wanted to continue my geology education; there was much to learn, and I was

excited to explore the opportunities. So, I applied for admittance to several graduate schools with the knowledge that I could not continue my education without financial scholarship/fellowship assistance. Much to my surprise I received some positive replies. These offers came from a variety of institutions ranging from giant NCAA Division 1 institutions down to smaller state and private colleges. That led to my critical decision in spring 1965—to attend the University of South Dakota in Vermillion (a college town that I really had never heard of)! So, it was off to the north land (at least north of my home in Kansas).

The decision to attend USD was one of those that was a "good one." Absolutely no regrets. I was a small-town kid who attended a smaller state undergraduate college and USD was situated in a small town and was full of small-town kids and a small graduate program—I think there were five of us. Students got much attention from the faculty.



Back in the olden days, that would be late 1960s, the Charcoal Lounge (AKA Char Bar) was one of the anchors in downtown Vermilion (as seen in this 2017 photo--it looked the same in 1965). The Char Barwasa 21 establishment since it served "hard liquor." That meant the underclassmen were relegated to the "beer bars" such as the Varsity.

My roommate at USD for those two years was a smalltown kid from n e a r b y Minnesota. After



graduation from a doctoral program, he had a very successful career with South Dakota School of Mines and Technology. During my recent trip to the Black Hills of South Dakota my mind drifted back to our grad school days as I drove through Buffalo Gap in the southern part of the Hills near Hot Springs. My current journey to that part of the Hills was three-fold: 1) to relive, at least in my mind, some of the field work associated with my thesis at USD; 2) to see if the Unkpapa Sandstone quarry was still open in Calico Canyon near the mouth of the Gap; and 3) to observe some nice roadside granite/pegmatite exposures near Wind Cave National Park.

So, off I went from my base at Custer State Park on my sentimental journey towards Buffalo Gap south of Rapid City but north of Hot Springs. My head was filled with thoughts and images from the mid-1960s and I sang along with the rock and roll blaring from the satellite radio (*My baby does the hanky panky*) thankful that radio had moved on from the old AM stations.

After reaching the turnoff to Buffalo Gap, I stopped my vehicle, turned down the radio, got out and breathed in the fresh air while contemplating important events in my life since that last trip 56 years ago. I remembered one of my mantras from an unknown author: *Life is a journey with problems* to solve and lessons to learn but most of all experiences to enjoy. Amen brother!

Unfortunately, my search for the quarry was unsuccessful as it had closed several years ago, and current landowners may not be interested in reopening (or allowing rockhounds on a sentimental journey). Fortunately, I had visited the guarry back in the 1960s and have a few sandstone specimens stuck on my rock shelf. What is so special about this sandstone? For starters, who could resist looking at rocks named the Unkpapa? The name was assigned to the stratigraphic unit by the famous geologist N.H. Darton as he studied and mapped the Hills in the early 1900s. "The type locality is in the ridges east and south of Hot Springs, Fall River Co, SD, on the Chadron arch in the southern Black Hills, where it reaches a thickness of more than 250 ft. The name is from Unkpapa Peak, sec 23, T6S, R6E, Custer County, SD near Buffalo Gap." (Darton and others, 1909). Actually, the word Unkpapa is a misrepresentation Hunkpapa (Lakota: Húŋkpapȟa), one of the of seven members of the Lakota tribe. The name  $H \dot{u} \eta k p a p \dot{h} a$  is a Lakota word meaning "Head of the Circle." By tradition, the Húŋkpapȟa set up their lodges at the entryway to the circle of the Great Council when the Sioux met in convocation. They speak Lakhóta, one of the three dialects of the Sioux language. (Access Genealogy, 2021). Sitting Bull (Thathánka Íyotake) and Gall (Phizi) were two well-known members of the Hunkpapa.

Second, the Calico Quarry has produced some fantastic specimens of banded sandstone described by Joe Hartman (1975) as "argillaceous, very fine-grained, massive quartz wacke sandstone; moderately indurated but friable, permeable, no indication of cement. Colors range from pale yellowish orange to grayish orange to pale red purple to pinkish gray. Color banding common, planar, curved, and Liesegang." The emphasis is mine as the rock produces slices commonly known as picture sandstone and at one time specimens were sold in virtually every rock shop and curio shop in the Black Hills and beyond (now replaced by picture sandstone from Utah). The better specimens were lavender in color and the banding often was displaced by numerous small faults.

I also note that my ole roommate from USD, Jim Fox, helped pen one of the definitive papers on the Unkpapa in the Black Hills. In 1981 Szigeti and Fox assigned the Unkpapa to the Morrison Formation (Late Jurassic) as its basal member and interpreted its depositional environment as eolian (by wind). Outcrops of the Unkpapa are restricted to part of the Cretaceous hogback between Sturgis, SD, and Edgemont, SD, a distance of about 100 miles. The unit conformably overlies the Sundance Formation and underlies either the main part of Morrison or the Lakota Formations, both with gradational or disconformable contacts. The Unkpapa is thickest around southern end of Black Hills where in outcrop it ranges up to 267 ft near Hot Springs but decreases slowly northward until it pinches out near Sturgis.

Szigeti and Fox (1981), and Blakey and others (1988), believed the Unkpapa Sandstone was correlative with sandstone beds at the base of the Morrison



Formation cropping out on the western flanks of the Black Hills uplift in South Dakota and eastern Wyoming. The Unkpapa dune field apparently was surrounded by lacustrine (lake) environments represented by mudstone layers in the Morrison Formation. As the region subsided, the dune field was inundated and eventually covered by lacustrine deposits.

One of my questions about the Unkpapa was answered by Szigeti and Fox: what was the source of the sand in the unit? They noted that as the inland Sundance Sea (marine, Middle to Upper Jurassic in age) withdrew from the Black Hills region, the climate became arid to semiarid.

Lacustrine and fluvial depositional systems were established on low-relief topography on which sediment of the Morrison Formation was deposited. At the same time, the Sundance Sandstone in an area of northwestern Nebraska, was being eroded and fine sand was being supplied to an eolian dune field which extended northward into low relief topography. These dune sands comprise the Unkpapa Sandstone, which overlies the Sundance Formation in the southeastern part of the Black Hills area. So, the Unkpapa sandstone is reworked Sundance Formation.

The Unkpapa often attracts attention due to its color banding commonly referred to as Liesegang Bands. These Bands are colored bands of cement, often containing authigenic minerals, that are secondary structures since they cut across normal bedding. Little is known about the mechanism creating these bands.

In the summer of 1966, I was working for the South Dakota Geological Survey and stationed in Chamberlain, a community on the Missouri River (now the location if I-90 crossing the River). During weekends I traveled to the plains/badlands immediately east of the southern Hills chasing "old river beds" (high level terrace gravels that had their source in the Black Hills). I often wondered if one of these ancient (late Tertiary) streams had come through Buffalo Gap.

The community of Buffalo Gap lies on the plains just to the east of the Hills. One author calls it a semi ghost town with a 100+ population. It first came into existence during the 1875-1876 Black Hills gold rush when a stage stop along the Sidney, Nebraska to Deadwood line was created. Ten years later the Fremont, Elkhorn, and Missouri Valley Railroad reached, and moved through, the

stage stop, and a railroad station was built and christened Buffalo Gap. The Elkhorn, as the railroad was known, was a line established in 1869 running from Omaha, Nebraska, west to Chadron (the Cowboy Line) and a decade later had established a branch line from Chadron north through Buffalo Gap, Rapid City, and on to Belle Foursch at the northern end of the Hills.



At one time huge herds of buffalo (American Bison) grazed on the grasslands of western South Dakota, including the prairies in Wind Cave National Park.

The name, Buffalo Gap, came from a

nearby (west) water gap where a small stream (Beaver Creek) flows through a valley where the Cretaceous hogback (upturned rocks dipping east that front the Black Hills on the east side). The Creek is an underfit stream and indicates the presence of a much larger stream in the geologic past.

Early travelers noted that buffalo (Bison) used the gap to travel back and forth to the interior of the uplands, and for shelter in the winter. Today a gravel road traverses the gap and is a nifty drive over to the grasslands of Wind Cave National Park.

At any rate, Buffalo Gap, the town, flourished in the late 1800s as a cattle shipping point for the nearby ranches. Population jumped up to 1200 persons. But like all good things the boom came to an end with drought, blizzards, overgrazing, dropping cattle prices, and closing railroads. The final kill came with the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl in the 1930s. Today the name lives on in the community, but mostly in the vast expanse of Buffalo Gap National Grassland.

A drive through Buffalo Gap will lead you to US 385, a paved road winding among the grasslands of Wind Cave National Park where bison still roam freely. After officially leaving the Park heading towards Pringle the road drops down from late Paleozoic rocks to the Cambrian Deadwood Formation and finally to the Precambrian outcrops of pegmatites, schists, and granites that seem to beckon rockhounds off the road into parking areas in the wide ditches. I found many black tourmaline (var. schorl, a borosilicate) small prismatic crystals scattered around "hunks" that had fallen off the outcrops.

And so ends my recent sentimental journey into the southern Black Hills as the strains of *Wild Thing* (The Troggs) still reverberates through my mind (I met my South Dakota spouse in 1966)!

Wild thing You make my heart sing You make everything groovy Wild thing

Wild thing, I think I love you But I wanna know for sure So come on and hold me tight I love you

### **RMFMS Official Convention Package**

This letter was sent to all RMFMS clubs on Friday, April 19, 2024:

A **credentials** form is for the person or persons representing the club in good standing to vote at the convention. Each club can have 2 votes either by a member of the club or by proxy for the club by someone they have chosen to vote for them.

A **Proxy** is when a Society will lack one or both votes because of the absence of Delegates or Alternates in the House of Delegates meeting, provided that the Proxy is presented to the Credentials Committee prior to the meeting so that the Committee may ascertain its validity, i.e., signed by an Executive Officer of the Society stating that they do not have a member who can attend the Delegates Meeting, and the Society wishes to have this person vote for them.

I will send out as soon as I know what we will be voting on at he meeting, but there might be things brought up at the meeting that can be voted on at that time, so prior notification cannot happen.

The attached file is the registration and information for the Rocky Mountain Federation Convention being held in Oklahoma City, Ok. The Oklahoma Mineral and Gem Society (OMGS) would like to thank the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies for allowing us to host the 2024 Annual Convention in Oklahoma City. We are looking forward to showing off our beautiful and fun state and hopefully you can stay longer to see what Oklahoma City has to offer! Our corresponding Rock and Mineral Show lasts 3 days so we hope you will have plenty of time to shop and become involved with the competitive displays, our educational classes and fluorescent room. We look forward to seeing our many Federation Friends and to making new ones throughout the show.

We have booked the Convention in the Downtown/Bricktown area where there are lots to see, do and experience. Please click on the underlined words to link to their websites. The negotiated room rates are for suites and regular queen and king rooms. This is the link to our host hotel, the <u>Wyndham Grand</u>. To reduce the room rates and because many of you have morning plans, only 1 breakfast per day is free per room. Additional breakfast(s) can be added at check-in for \$10 per additional guests, tips are your responsibility. Valet parking is \$22 per day for "in and out parking" but street parking is free after 5:00 pm on Friday to Monday morning. For those who plan to stay extra days, the hotel is offering the same room rate during adjoining nights. Please don't delay making your reservations; depending on other scheduled events in Oklahoma City, hotels can fill up fast.

Our show is in the Modern Living Building in Oklahoma City at the <u>State Fairgrounds</u>, approximately 5 miles west from the Wyndham Grand. We have 40 vendors, door prizes, competitive display cases, Children Education programs/activities, competitive displays, demonstrations, and a fluorescent room. The set up for vendors and display cases is Thursday October 24<sup>th</sup> from noon to 7:00 pm. The show ends Sunday October 27 at 5:00 pm, so break down of display cases starts at 5:00 pm.

We have planned 3 field trips, one for each morning of the convention day to be hosted by our friends from other clubs in our state! Details are still being finalized. We presently will look for the <u>Oklahoma State Rock</u>, (Barite Rose), for <u>Boley Agates</u> and we will visit the General Material Gravel Pit where you can find bison bones, <u>Alibates Flint</u>, petrified wood and sometimes you will get lucky and find a mastodon tooth. We may also tour the behind-the-scenes vertebrate paleontology collection stored at the Sam Noble Museum. Location maps will be placed in your registration packets.

Oklahoma City has plenty to offer for entertainment. We are working with Oklahoma City Travel and they have a great planning site available on their <u>website</u>, including <u>maps</u>, to get you around on your leisure time. The site is also a great planning tool for selecting <u>offsite venues</u>, <u>dining options</u> and providing visitor information services to you once you arrive in Oklahoma City. There is an electric trolley-car pickup across the street from the hotel that will take you to Bricktown, Midtown, the Art District to see the Art Museum, the Theater District, the <u>National Memorial</u>, and to many downtown parks. The <u>First American Museum</u> recently opened and it is a must-see museum just south of I-40. Oklahoma City Thunder begins their pre-season games in early October and their first NBA games will be during the Convention.

The Award Ceremony will start at 6:00 pm on Saturday night at the Bourbon Street Café on the Bricktown Canal. Come early and take a ride on the Bricktown Water Taxi to see the Land Run Sculptures. Join us for 5:00 happy hour at the Café.

The 8:00 am Sunday's Award Breakfast with Editors and Webmasters will be at IHOP in Bricktown. Please plan to attend and support all those who work hard to promote and educate others about our Clubs.

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# RMFMS Purpose & Policies –

Excerpts from 2023 Directory (Revised)

- To bring about a closer association of the Earth Science Groups in the Rocky Mountain region.
- To increase and disseminate knowledge about minerals and other geologic materials.
- To encourage mineral study, collecting, and fashioning as a HOBBY.
- To sponsor local organizations interested in similar purposes.
- To encourage all clubs to publish bulletins and newsletters.
- To continue building up and promoting the use of the Federation Library of slide programs, videos, CDs, and DVDs to each member club.
- To distribute information and suggestions on the preparation and arrangement of specimens and materials for exhibit and display.
- To provide information and assistance to clubs holding Gem and Mineral Shows.
- To encourage clubs to support the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies Scholarship Foundation Fund.

### AFMS Code of Ethics

-I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without the owner's permission.

-I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

-I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

-l will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.

-I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind-fences, signs, buildings.

-I will leave all gates as found.I will build fires in designated or safe places only and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

-I will discard no burning material-matches, cigarettes, etc.

-I will fill all excavation holes, which may be dangerous to livestock.

-l will not contaminate wells, creeks or other water supply.

-I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

- To promote the concept that all members of all clubs are members of the RMFMS and the AFMS, and to encourage individual members and clubs to take responsibility for asking questions or making known that help is needed. To encourage more contacts between those working at the Federation level, between clubs, and between club members.
- To keep the members informed of problems and activities regarding the use of Public Lands.
- To continue to support Federation-sponsored programs.

The Rocky Mountain Federation is composed of a membership of approximately 9000 members in the following states: Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, Nevada, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, and Wyoming.

The work of the Federation is directed by the Executive Committee, composed of: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Historian, State Directors, and the two immediate Past-Presidents.
